MINUTES

Welcome/Introductions (R. Taylor)

R. Taylor opened the meeting at 9:30 am. She welcomed all SICC members and attendees. All participants provided brief introductions.

Review and Approval of Minutes (R. Taylor)

SICC Committee Reports

The following updates were provided on the work of the SICC Committees:

• **Personnel Preparation Committee**: J. Parker, Chair, reported the Committee has grown significantly. The Committee continues to talk about what they want to accomplish. We recognize that moving forward with our inquiry about competency preparation within preservice programs is still really high on our list and that's what we want to accomplish. We attempted to do that over the last year in the middle of the pandemic and our survey did not

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go over very well at that point for a lot of reasons but mainly because of the pandemic and second the survey was not in a good space to provide clarity. We always use the same jargon that we do in Part C programming so we are back at the drawing board and have a lot of interest on how to design that and what it should look like. We had a good discussion about ECPC, academic programs, and transitioning over to in-service as well. We also set some timelines with what to do in regard to working on a survey this summer and having it ready to go out in the Fall. We will be using many of the ECPC resources. Another goal of the committee is to push out those resources to pre-service programs so that not only are we training with the same goal in mind, but also with the same material as well. When our students come together in the field with actual children and families, they have this foundation of knowledge that they have already built on that. The second component is trying to figure out how we can fill some of those gaps.

- Public Awareness Committee: K. Driver, Chair, reported that the Committee has been working on our newsletter. The Committee has gotten with M. Richardson to help revamp the website. That's the Committee latest project.
- Transition Committee: C. Henington, Chair, reported that the Committee is a critical component because it has direct links to indicators for both Part C as well as Part B. Part B functions totally different relative to Part C. There are differences in eligibility and for some parents may find themselves without services just because their child no longer meets eligibility. There is an IEP instead of an IFSP. Parents really do need assistance in understanding what the transition process is as well as knowing what to expect. The transition committee is really a service for those families that are transitioning. The committee will discuss a new time to meet for their monthly meeting.
- Recruitment/Retention Ad Hoc Committee: S. Callender reported that the Ad Hoc Committee will end unless the Council agree to add it back. This committee looked at things including looking at reimbursement rates which the agency is still working on and hoping to get approved by the Health Board. The Committee also developed an enrollment packet that is now on our website. The enrollment packet describes the program, talks about our links to things like our regulations, and also have the forms that some people would fill out to become an Early Intervention provider and other links. We were able to get new pins abdicated to us and get the tiered levels. We have one position for service coordinators and a higher one for service coordinator coaches. With the flexibility that the personnel board has it will give us the ability to increase pay when people get an early intervention credential. Some of the things we are doing to help with retention is new training. We are providing early intervention credentials free for staff members to be able to earn those. The fee for participating is twelve hundred dollars but we are paying for the staff to do that. The Council agreed to keep the Ad Hoc Committee, but the name will be changed to Provider Participation Committee.
