Introduction

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, unintentional traumatic injury is the leading cause of death in the United States for persons between the ages of 1 and 44 (WISQARS, 2018). Mississippi is no exception to this statistic. Moreover, in 2018 there were 33,654 motor vehicle crash fatalities in the United States. 597 of these fatalities occurred as a result of injuries sustained on Mississippi roads (FARS, 2020). Motor vehicle crashes are the leading cause of death among the teenage population in the United States (CDC, Teen Driver, 2019). Mississippi ranks 5th in the nation in terms of the number of teens killed in motor vehicle crashes ("Mississippi Fatalities and Injuries for Youth and Adult Highway Crashes," 2017). These statistics are widely circulated and well known, but they reflect the extent to which trauma is a public health concern, not only in the United States, generally, but in Mississippi, specifically.

To improve outcomes for trauma patients, the Mississippi Trauma Care System established the following primary goal: to deliver the *right* patient to the *right* hospital the *first* time. Research shows this approach to trauma care saves lives.

Mississippi's Trauma System dates to 1991, when the Mississippi Legislature charged the Mississippi State Department of Health (MSDH) with responsibility for oversight of trauma system development. The Legislature passed House Bill 966 in 1998, officially establishing Mississippi's Trauma System. The Trauma System of Care Plan and Trauma System Rules and Regulations provide the operational authority and framework for the Trauma System.

MSDH is the lead agency in Trauma System development and execution and partners with system stakeholders thoughout the state. Historically, MSDH opted to contract with trauma regions for administering regional trauma system activities; however, following the advice of the Mississippi Trauma Advisory Committee (MTAC), MSDH reviewed the efficacy of the regional system and found opportunities for reducing administrative and educational costs and improving on the scope and quality of trauma-related educational offerings. In an effort to save on costs and improve on quality MSDH contracted with the Mississippi Trauma Care System Foundation, Inc., a foundation of the Mississippi Hospital Association, for services formerly provided by trauma care regions, beginning on April 16, 2020.

As suggested by the Mississippi Trauma Care Task Force, this report on the Mississippi Trauma Care System will be submitted quarterly to the Mississippi State Board of Health.








Legislative Bill signed on May 9, 2017 requiring all passengers in vehicle to wear seatbelts


Incidents by Age and Gender




ATV Injuries (Protective Devices) - Pediatric




ATV Injuries (Protective Devices) – Adult




