

Mississippi Public Health Success Stories

Health Services

Women's Health

- 90,000 pap smears in 2002
- 99.5% error free rate
- Provide 14% of maternity care in the state
- 500% – 600% reduction in technical errors



The Mississippi Department of Health's Women, Infants and Children's Breastfeeding Promotion and Support Program has been recognized as a national model by the USDA Food and Nutrition Services.

Loving Support Makes Breastfeeding Work Campaign recognized:

- National Model for 19 states
- Mississippi breastfeeding rates increased 10% in 2 years



A formal evaluation of the Mississippi Loving Support campaign showed it had made a profound impact on Mississippi's breastfeeding rates. Initiation rates soared, improving from 27% before the campaign to 37% just 2 years after the campaign.

Mississippi moved from 50th in the country to 48th in breastfeeding initiation and from 50th in the country to 33rd in breastfeeding duration at 6 months. The campaign also improved the level of community support perceived by mothers throughout the state.

Mississippi's efforts will now be the model for states as widespread as Alaska, Vermont and Kentucky, as well as sixteen others.

Genetic Screening

- Expanded newborn genetic testing – House Bill 717
- Screens for 40 disorders
- Mississippi leads the nation
- Results in 5-7 days



On June 1, 2003, the Mississippi State Department of Health began screening Mississippi babies for a total of 40 genetic disorders, making Mississippi the first state in the nation to provide such an extensive newborn screening program.

“Comprehensive newborn screening will prove to be a great benefit for the children of Mississippi,” said Mississippi State Health Officer Brian Amy, MD, MHA, MPH. “The Health Department’s mission is to promote and protect the public’s health and what better way can we do that, especially where our children are concerned.”



The Ben Haygood Comprehensive Newborn Screening Program Act, also known as House Bill 717 in the 2002 legislative session, authorized the Mississippi State Board of Health to determine and specify disorders to be included in the comprehensive newborn screening program. Mississippi Governor Ronnie Musgrove believes that this groundbreaking genetic screening will contribute to a healthier Mississippi. *I am thrilled that Mississippi is taking the lead in protecting the health of its little ones, said Musgrove. Our children are the future. These tests provide critical information for parents that can help determine their newborn’s long-term health.*



Poison Control Partnership

- UMC/MSDH Poison Control Partnership professionally-staffed poison control center
- Funded by MSDH
- Biological and chemical agent surveillance, detection and emergency response



During Budget Year Four, the Mississippi State Department of Health will continue to maintain a strong collaborative relationship with the University of Mississippi Medical Center (UMMC). The Mississippi Poison Control Center is operated by UMMC and will continue to play a vital role in biological and chemical agent surveillance and detection, patient management, and emergency response throughout the state. The Poison Control Center will be funded at a higher level than last year.

Tuberculosis

- 98% compliance
- Model for the nation
- Rates continue to decline for the last 13 years

Keeping latent TB patients current in their treatment is the key to prevention. The number of current patients in Mississippi has been falling, but a new program begun in February 2003 cut this figure dramatically in just over a month.



After just 30 days the administration’s new emphasis on setting goals, creating expectations, and improving performance cut the number of non-current cases almost in half. After 90 days the original goal was not only met, but exceeded original expectations.

Mississippi is not just improving its handling of TB in the state. It has been a model for the nation as a whole, outperforming the national average for the last two years, and is the *only* state to have a decline in tuberculosis for 13 years in a row. State health departments and the national Centers for Disease Control and Prevention look to Mississippi's tuberculosis program for an example of leadership and performance.

Immunization

- Nationally recognized award winning childhood immunization program
- Latest figures rate Mississippi 5th in the nation for 2-year immunization completion
- Re-energized push to vaccinate senior citizens for pneumonia and flu



Meningococcal meningitis broke out in DeSoto county schools in March, with six cases identified in just 10 days

- 6,127 preventive vaccinations – accomplished in one week
- No new cases since vaccinations
- Up to 1,500 vaccinations a day were administered by public health nurses

Smallpox Vaccination



- Over 360 vaccinations
- No adverse reactions
- Completed in five weeks

Part of the national smallpox vaccination effort, Mississippi began its smallpox vaccination program for healthcare workers and public health first-responders in February of this year. The result has been an unqualified success. We continue to work with all of our state partners and the CDC in this ongoing effort.



West Nile Virus

Fight The Bite

- Extensive education campaign, including community outreach
- Prevention and protection
- August 2002, 64 cases were reported, August 2003 only 16 cases were reported

Public health education campaign materials and a media campaign — including television and radio public service announcements, cooperation and community outreach with leaders throughout the state, and a website focus — places Mississippi in the forefront on public awareness of this mosquito-borne illness.

Oral Health

- \$500,000 oral health grant to expand community water fluoridation statewide
- Establish ongoing education and training to support fluoridation advocacy
- Fulfill national health goals as requested in US Healthy People 2010



Fluoridation is the single most effective public health measure to prevent tooth decay and to improve oral health over a lifetime.

The community fluoridation program, funded by a Bower grant, will build local advocates from civic leadership. The fluoride administrator will train civic leaders to promote, implement and sustain a fluoride program in their areas.

Trauma Care System

- 80 designated centers
- Level I, II, III, IV
- Definitive care to treat shock

Trauma centers were established to help identify and better utilize services that take advantage of the patient's critical *Golden Hour*. The Health Department reviews the facilities and makes recommendations for designation.



Mississippi now has 80 designated trauma centers throughout the state.

Under Mississippi law, hospital emergency departments can seek designation as a Level I, II, III or IV trauma center, with Level I requiring the most resources. The designations set specific criteria and standards of care that guide hospital and emergency personnel in the appropriate transfer and optimal treatment of trauma victims.

Environmental Health – Food Protection



- Nationally recognized for working to meet voluntary FDA retail food program standards
- Leads the country in training all county environmentalists working with food and food related issues
- Leads the country in technology for proper food protection



Environmental Health – On-site Wastewater Reporting

- Standardized, automated and accessible
- Centralization and documentation of information statewide
- Eliminate lengthy processing

Computerization provides oversight for the wastewater disposal permit system and establishes a quality improvement monitoring process.

This automation will:

- Provide more objective decisions based on quantitative data from the field
- Record each property and provide historical documentation
- Reduce the time spent in each step of the application process
- Increase efficiency through centralization
- Put the customer first by providing immediate information and access



Environmental Health – Water Supply

- Oversees 1,424 public water supplies throughout the state
 - Compliance rates among the highest in the country
 - Capacity assessment program is a national model

Certificate of Need

- Prevents duplication
- Cost containment
- 500 + applications reviewed – \$4 billion expenditures

Mississippi's Certificate of Need process is a fundamental component of the State's health planning and health regulatory activities. For the first time in its history, the application process will be based on automated procedures and objective data to immediately determine the viability of CON applications decisions, prevent unnecessary duplication of health resources, contain costs, and ultimately improve the health of Mississippi residents by increasing accessibility, continuity and quality of health services.



County Health Profiles

- County vital statistics population demographics
- Maternal and child health indicators
- Causes of illness and death; causes and prevention of injuries


County Health Profiles provide an overview of the health status for each county at a glance. The profile's demographic data help reveal ethnic and racial disparities in public health and health services on a detailed county-by-county basis. Because they are web-based, the profiles provide clear and immediate information around the clock, statewide, at much lower distribution costs.



Performance Accountability

- Legislature enacts Performance Accountability Act – MSDH is first agency to implement, and with no additional funding
- Office of Organizational Quality ensures performance accountability
- MSDH measures everything it does to assure error-free performance

The development of new performance indicators will enable quarterly evaluations of each District Office's operations as part of our ongoing efforts to achieve optimal service statewide.

Organizational Quality

Organizational Quality is responsible for internal auditing and performance review activities. The office consists of Performance Accountability, Service Quality and Public Health Nursing.

- **Performance Accountability** conducts internal audits/reviews of the central office, county health departments, WIC distribution centers and regional home health offices. These audits/reviews measure compliance with current program and agency policies and procedures.
- **Service Quality** conducts an annual review of each district to ensure systems are in place to monitor the quality of services provided in each county health department; reviews the corrective action/responses to Performance Accountability reports and follows up to determine training needs, trends, opportunities for improvement and policy changes; and ensures the agency is in compliance with current HIPAA (Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act) requirements.
- **Public Health Nursing** monitors the standards of practice across program lines. Through these monitoring and consultative activities, Public Health Nursing provides assistance in determining staffing needs, classification needs, continuing education needs and personnel management for the nursing component of the public health care delivery system.


State Health Plan provides planning for health services, facilities, and manpower on a statewide basis through the development and publication of the State Health Plan (SHP), administering the state certificate of need (CON) program, and maintaining the Office of Rural Health to address rural health care needs.



- **Certificate of Need Program**, a regulatory mechanism, is designed to balance the growth of health facilities and services with the need for those services. Accordingly, staff provide technical assistance to health care facilities and conduct CON reviews of proposed capital expenditures for defined health care facilities and providers.
 - **Rural Health** is responsible for maintaining an information clearinghouse on rural health care issues and innovative approaches to the delivery of rural health care services; coordinating state rural health care activities; providing information on federal, state, and foundation programs to improve rural health care and assisting public and private non-profit entities to participate in programs; collecting data and conducting policy analysis of rural health issues; and assisting hospitals and communities in the recruitment and retention of health care professionals.

Chief of Staff and Operations

The Deputy Director administers the Office of Communications, the Office of Finance and Accounts, the Office of Human Resources, and the Office of Health Districts Administration. Miller is charged with overseeing the agency's role in communicating public health messages, employee personnel issues, district level administration, and the agency budget. As Chief of Staff and Operations, Miller is dedicated to quality public health and performance-based accountability, but most importantly promoting and protecting Mississippi's public health.

- **Communications** plans and coordinates agency-wide communications activities on a county, district and state level and houses a variety of professional and versatile talent that allows the Communications staff to handle mass media relations, graphic art, campaign development, marketing, website development, and public records requests. The Office also assumes responsibility for emergency and risk communications within the agency.
- **Human Resources** is responsible for hiring the state's public health workforce and also for dealing with personnel issues within the agency. The Mississippi State Department of Health has 2,810 employees located throughout the state.
- **Finance and Accounts** is tasked with handling the agency's budget and administering the agency's financial spending in the public health arena.
- **Health Districts Administration** consists of two basic areas of public health services delivery in the state of Mississippi: the county health departments located in every county and the Bureau of Home Health.

Communications

The Office of Communications plans and coordinates agency-wide communications activities on a county, district and state level. The office serves as the authorized channel for the release of official information about the Mississippi State Department of Health, its programs and policies.



The Office of Communications houses a variety of professional talent that allows the office to serve multiple functions within the agency: employee relations, mass media relations, graphic art, campaign development, marketing, website development, and public records requests. The Office of Communications also assumes responsibility for emergency and risk communications for the Mississippi State Department of Health.

The Communications staff continues to assess and develop its risk communications plan, research its audiences, train its employees, and produce and implement an emergency preparedness campaign.

The Agency web site serves as a community resource for health and emergency information, and offers on-line versions of popular and essential services. The Office continues to develop and expand the site in response to public needs and interests.



Human Resources

The Office of Human Resources is responsible for the state's public health workforce with regard to the classification and compensation of each position, employment and recruitment, employee services and benefits, affirmative action and employee relations and professional enrichment.

The Office of Human Resources for the State Department of Health operates under the rules and regulations of the Mississippi State Personnel Board. All federal and state personnel rules, regulations and laws are adhered to under this direction. The State Department of Health is an Equal Employment Opportunity Agency.



Finance and Accounts



Fiscal Year 2003 Expenditures By Major Category




Funding Sources For Fiscal Year 2003 Expenditures





Office of Health Districts Administration


Office of Health Districts Administration consists of two basic areas of public health services delivery in the state of Mississippi: the county health departments located in every county and the Bureau of Home Health.

- **Home Health** provides home health services through the state and has done so since 1965. Home Health has 13 offices throughout the state and accepts referrals for services in compliance with Medicare and Medicaid, and as one of the low cost providers in the state. Services provided by Home Health's delivery system include skilled nursing; home health; physical, occupational and/or speech therapy; patient equipment and medical supplies; medical social services; laboratory and pharmacy services; and diet and nutritional counseling.
- **County Health Departments**

The Mississippi State Department of Health operates at least one county health department in every county. County Health Department staff generally include public health nurses, nurse practitioners, physicians, disease investigators, environmentalists, medical records clerks, social workers and nutritionists.

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County health departments provide a range of public health services to Mississippians: immunizations, family planning, WIC Supplemental Food Program, tuberculosis treatment and prevention services, and sexually transmitted disease services. Other services such as child and maternal services are available based on the county's needs. The Health Department maintains programs to reduce the risk of particular health problems and to control or prevent such non-communicable diseases as diabetes, cancer, hypertension, and cardiovascular disease.



The Office of Science

Office of Science and Evaluation

The purpose of this new office is to incorporate and foster science and research into the public health practice and policies of the MSDH. This new knowledge is crucial in design and implementation of MSDH programs and for the MSDH to understand and identify target areas and populations for improvement interventions.

Informatics collects and analyzes fundamental data on the health of Mississippians and oversees information processing for the Mississippi State Department of Health through its three Divisions:

- Technology infrastructure support
- Patient information management system
- Public health statistics

Technology Infrastructure Support is responsible for operation of the agency's computer hardware including the primary administrative system and all personal computers.

The unit is also responsible for data processing related procurement, software support, maintenance of computer hardware, and operation of the statewide computer network.



This unit provides telecommunications facilities for the agency.

Patient Information Management System (PIMS) is the statewide operational system that tracks patient services and billing of clinic and lab services to Medicaid, Medicare and the Children's Health Insurance Program.

Public Health Statistics provides a system of vital and health statistics for use at the local, district, state, and federal levels; provides direct vital records services to the general public; provides statistical survey methods, evaluation, and statistical computer systems expertise to district, administrative, and programmatic staff; and provides information on births and infant deaths, a listing of births for immunization follow-up, and all Sudden Infant Death Syndrome deaths for follow-up by district and county nurses.



Collects and processes information for approximately 450,000 patients and 1,200,000 patient visits per year

The Office of Epidemiology

Office of Epidemiology is responsible for gathering data regarding reportable diseases, in some cases providing laboratory confirmation; and contact investigation and follow-up for cases which require provision of prophylactic medication, vaccine, and/or counseling.

The Office carefully watches occurrences and trends of reportable diseases, investigates outbreaks of diseases, helps interrupt outbreaks or disease problems, and reports morbidity incidence and trends to the medical community and the public.

- **The Central Cancer Registry** collects and maintains data on all invasive cancer cases diagnosed among state residents. Data is used to determine incidence rates of all major cancer types and to identify incidence variations for high-risk population groups or geographic areas within the state. Registry data is also used to determine whether progress is being made toward meeting state and national goals for cancer control.

During FY 2003, approximately 20,000 cases of reportable diseases were recorded.

Reported cases included such diseases and conditions as required, including encephalitis, E.Coli 0157:H7, hepatitis, Lyme disease, malaria, meningitis, salmonellosis, rabies, tetanus, tularemia, rocky mountain spotted fever, legionellosis, tuberculosis, and sexually transmitted diseases.

- **The Surveillance Branch** conducts injury surveillance, hazardous substances emergency events surveillance, and environmental surveillance. The Branch responds to more than 600 environmental telephone calls annually, providing consultations and on-site investigations.
- **The Injury Surveillance Program** and registry is a comprehensive, sensitive system that identifies and tracks spinal cord injuries and traumatic brain injuries. The program reviews more than 400 potential spinal cord injury cases and more than 3,800 traumatic brain injury cases annually.
- **The Hazardous Substances Emergency Events Surveillance** system describes the public health consequences associated with the release of hazardous substances (excluding petroleum products). The system identifies more than 1,000 potentially hazardous substances emergency events annually.
- **Immunization Program** staff strive to ultimately eliminate morbidity and mortality from vaccine-preventable diseases by working with federal and state agencies, local health departments, physicians and other private immunization providers, schools, hospitals, nursing homes, licensed child care facilities, community-based organizations, and the public. Targeted diseases include diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis, polio, measles, mumps, rubella, varicella, Haemophilus influenza type B, hepatitis B, influenza and pneumonia.

In FY 2003, Mississippi reported:

- 65 cases of hepatitis A
- 11 cases of pertussis (whooping cough)
- seven cases of mumps
- no cases of measles, diphtheria, or polio.

In CY 2002,

- 89.9 percent of Mississippi's two-year-olds were fully immunized by 27 months.



● **Sexually Transmitted Disease (STD)/Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV)** consists of four branches:

- Surveillance,
- Quality Assurance,
- Prevention and Education,
- CARE and Services.

The Surveillance and Quality Assurance Branches provide ongoing, systematic collection, analysis, evaluation, and dissemination of data describing STDs and HIV disease.

The Prevention and Education Branch plans, implements and evaluates prevention interventions designed to reach high priority target populations. It also coordinates the distribution and management of federal funding provided to nine community-based organizations (CBOs) throughout the state.

The CARE and Services Branch manages funds Mississippi receives under the provision of Title II of the Ryan White Comprehensive AIDS Resources Emergency (CARE) Act. These federal dollars are often the only funds available to people living with HIV disease for life-sustaining therapies. The Housing Opportunities for People with AIDS (HOPWA) Program, also managed by this branch, enables people living with HIV disease and their families to remain together by providing assistance for emergency and long-term housing, and with essential activities of daily living.

The staff also operates the Mobile Medical Clinic, a 38-foot long vehicle with two examination and treatment rooms, complete climate control, and a power generation system that allows it to appear at numerous events and sustain operations independent of any external support.

● **Tuberculosis Program** provides early and rapid detection of persons with or at risk of developing tuberculosis, appropriate treatment and follow-up of diagnosed cases of tuberculosis, and preventive therapy to persons at risk of developing tuberculosis.

- *In CY 2002, recorded 4.75 cases per 100,000 people*
- *Children represented 7.5 percent of Mississippi's TB cases*
- *Mississippi had a 52 percent decrease in new cases*
- *In CY 2002, 44 percent of the 2,357 people received directly observed therapy treatment for latent tuberculosis infection*
- *Conducted 70 TB skin test certification workshops*

STD/HIV

- *Mississippi now ranks 19th in the nation in syphilis, down from first in the nation eight years ago.*
- *The number of new HIV cases in Mississippi continues to decline from 707 in 1995 to 580 in 2002.*
- *During CY 2002, 49 cases of Primary and Secondary (P & S) Syphilis were reported – a 65 percent decrease from CY 2001.*
- *During CY 2002, an estimated 15, 000 people benefitted from these services.*
- *The AIDS Drug Program served over 1,000 people in CY 2002.*
- *The Home-Based Program provided aerosolized pentamidine and injection therapies to 85 people.*

-
- **Pharmacy** provides medication for patients at the county level who are enrolled in one or more of approximately 15 public health programs. Most patients served are classified as medically indigent. *The intravenous admixture program* allows cystic fibrosis patients to be released from hospitals at earlier dates and to be managed through home health care, thereby reducing health care expenses.

- *Processed approximately 120,000 prescriptions*
- *Processed 30,000 shipments of clinic supplies*



- **Public Health Laboratory**, built in 1956, serves as a reference lab for the entire state, providing low-cost, high-quality testing services. Laboratory personnel provide clinical and environmental analysis for public health clinics, private physicians, hospitals, laboratories, public water systems, and individuals.



The Mississippi's Public Health Laboratory is accredited by the Food and Drug Administration for milk testing, the Environmental Protection Agency for drinking water testing, and the U.S. Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (Medicare) for clinical testing. The lab is registered and accredited under the Clinical Laboratory Improvement Act and is a member of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the Association of Public Health Laboratories Laboratory Response Network for Bioterrorism.

Lab staff process more than 750,000 specimens a year

The Office of Health Protection

Health protection for the people of Mississippi is one of the chief responsibilities of the Mississippi State Department of Health. From the quality of our food and water, to child care and professional licensing, our concerns embrace every aspect of life across the state. Our goal is to achieve and maintain the highest standard of health for all Mississippians.

- ***Terrorism Preparedness and Response Planning***

The Mississippi State Department of Health terrorism preparedness and response planning is part of the overall state plan that will be coordinated through the Mississippi Emergency Management Agency (MEMA) if an event occurs or appears likely.

- ***The Emergency Medical Services Division (EMS)*** organizes, regulates, and maintains a statewide program to improve emergency medical care; tests and certifies Emergency Medical Technicians (EMTs) on the basic, intermediate, and paramedic levels; and administers federal and state funding for local level EMS.

EMTs responded to more than 314,000 calls for help in FY 2003.

During FY 2003, the 20th year of the EMS Operating Fund's existence, the State Department of Health, Division of EMS spent \$2.02 million to enhance Emergency Medical Services in Mississippi. Collections came from a \$5 assessment on each moving vehicle violation fine.



- ***Environmental Health*** oversees programs to control hazards to health from radioactive materials, x-ray devices, unsafe boilers and pressure vessels, and rats, mosquitoes and other disease vectors; administers the state-authorized consultative occupational health and safety program; and enforces standards for protection of consumers against preventable hazards in food, milk and water.




Public health's approximately 111 county and field environmentalists issued final approvals for:

- *4,875 individual onsite wastewater disposal systems*
- *1,618 existing wastewater disposal systems*
- *76 sewage pumpers' licenses*
- *813 private wells*
- *440 rabies investigations*
- *54 recreational vehicle park permits*
- *3,961 general sanitation complaints*

-
- **The Radiological Health Division** maintains and enforces regulatory standards designed to ensure that the exposure of Mississippians to harmful radiation is kept at a low level.

The staff :

- *Inspected 2,197 x-ray devices used in the healing arts profession and 132 radioactive material licenses;*
- *Inspected and analyzed 1,240 environmental samples from the vicinity of Grand Gulf Nuclear Station and the Salmon Test Site in Lamar County;*
- *Tested 660 water supplies for radioactivity in accordance with EPA Safe Drinking Water Act, and 292 water supplies for radon;*
- *Evaluated 1,347 occupied areas in public schools and government buildings for radon.*




- **The Water Supply Division** regulates the engineering design, construction, operation and maintenance of public water systems; coordinates the water quality monitoring program; enforces the water quality standards of the Federal and Mississippi Safe Drinking Water Acts; ensures that each community/non-transient non-community public water system is operated by a certified waterworks operator; and administers the Drinking Water State Revolving Loan Fund.



Division of Water Supply helps to ensure that the 2.7 million Mississippians, approximately 95% of the state's population who rely on the state's 1,406 public water systems, are routinely provided safe drinking water .

- **Bureau of General Environmental Services** inspects and issues permits to food-handling establishments, including conventional restaurants, fast food franchises, institutions, hospitals and schools.



General Environmental Services:

- 39,794 food establishments inspected
- 102 sanitation and nutrition inspections for Mississippi correctional facilities
- 12,475 soil/site evaluations
- 113 environmental lead assessments
- Handled approximately 268 consultations concerning pests, their relationship to human health, and other pest problems
- Performed 1,560 routine dairy inspections
- 160 bottled water processors received permits



- **The Licensure Bureau** provides oversight and enforcement of regulations and technical support for the provision of emergency medical services; provides minimum standards of health and safety in child care facilities; and provides licensure of special health professionals and health care facilities.

The Licensure Bureau:

- Licensed or registered in excess of 8,000 individuals in allied health professions
- Licensed 1,785 child care facilities and 3,357 inspections completed
- Inspected and licensed 42 youth camps
- Investigated approximately 573 complaints related to child care facilities and providers

- **The Boiler/Pressure Vessel Safety Division** protects people and property from injury and damage due to boiler and pressure vessel explosions.

- Boiler And Pressure Safety Division*
- 11,744 objects inspected in FY 2003
 - Noted 324 dangerous violations



Office of Health Promotion

The Office of Health Promotion works to prevent disease and injury and promote optimal health through health education, program implementation, policy development, evaluation, and partnerships. It provides support services aimed at schools, community health and work site programs to improve the health of all Mississippians.



- **Bureau of Health Education** provides and supports services aimed at schools, communities, worksites and health care settings.
- Through its **Tobacco Prevention** program the Mississippi State Department of Health is continuing to take actions in making tobacco prevention a mechanism for positive social change.
- **Cardiovascular Health (CVH) Program** since September 1998 has received funding from CDC to conduct activities to identify and address the burden of cardiovascular disease in Mississippi.



- **Injury and Violence Prevention Program** provides public education, technical assistance and safety assessment and awareness of preventable death and disability due to injury and violence.

In FY 2003, 5,840 car seats were distributed and 1,999 smoke alarms were installed.

- **Community and School Health Program** advocates community awareness, public health education and coordinated school health education initiatives that promote healthy lifestyles.
- **The Chronic Disease Program** serves in the capacity of program planning, objective setting, establishing protocol, quality assurance, and lending support services to public health districts and county health departments.

- **The Diabetes Program** provides support services for persons with diabetes including screening and referral for definitive diagnosis, joint medical management, education, informational materials and diet counseling.

In FY 2003, the Diabetes Program conducted 377 treatment (nurse) visits.

- **Diabetes Prevention and Control Program (DPCP)** is funded by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and addresses seven national objectives: to increase annual foot examinations, increase annual eye examinations, increase flu/pneumococcal vaccinations, increase HgA1C testing, reduce health disparities, establish successful wellness programs and establish measurement procedures to track the program's success.

- **The Hypertension Program** provides screening, detection, diagnosis, treatment or referral for treatment, and follow-up on compliance in cooperation with the patient's physician as a joint management effort.

In FY 2003, the Hypertension Program conducted 5,501 treatment (nurse) visits.



Office of Health Disparity

The newly created Office of Health Disparity (established this year), will assist in carrying out the Mississippi State Department of Health's mission to promote and protect the health status of all Mississippians through education and elimination of health disparities. Our goal is to eradicate health disparities within our agency and advocate removing health disparities throughout Mississippi. Despite notable progress in the overall health of the nation, research shows continuing disparities in the burden of illness, medical access and

treatment, and death experienced by various cultural and social groups throughout the country. The demographic changes anticipated over the next decade magnify the importance of addressing disparities in health status, especially in Mississippi.

- Health disparity is defined as unequal healthcare or access to healthcare for various populations.
- Differences and/or disparities may include income groups, age groups, rural/urban groups and other geographical groups, racial and ethnic groups, cultural groups, and special needs populations including those with physical and mental disabilities or challenges.
- The Office of Health Disparity will determine the level of differentiation in major health conditions; develop partnerships with private and public sectors to bring about change; and correct and eradicate disparities within the Mississippi State Department of Health
- An objective of this new office is to assure and encourage quality and equal health care for all citizens.

Office of Health Services

The Office of Health Services addresses women and children's health care needs in Mississippi. Health programs provide Mississippi women and children in the state with optimal health opportunities by offering services and assistance in the areas of dental and oral health, breast and cervical cancer, early intervention, and related programs.


- **Dental and Oral Health** targets efforts toward improving the oral health of Mississippi children and their families. *Through the work of the Governor's Oral Health Task Force, priority goals have been established for oral health, said State Dental Director, Dr. Nick Mosca. Those goals include creating an effective oral health services infrastructure to assure oral disease prevention and control; ensuring available, accessible, affordable and timely access to dental care; and implementing and assuring effective population based oral health programs that assure good oral health for children.*

- *Our state objective will be to assure that at least 75 percent of Mississippi's population will receive fluoridated drinking water.*
- *As of December 2002, 136 Mississippi community systems were serving fluoridated water to over one million Mississippi residents, about 42 percent of the state's population.*

- **Child Health Services** provide preventive and sick child services statewide to children at or below 185 percent of poverty. Treatment is often included for those whose need is greatest. Children in need of further care are linked with other State Department of Health programs and/or private care providers necessary for effective treatment and management.



In FY 2003:

- *Over 60,000 children and adolescents received preventive and acute health services through the local county health departments*
- *Sudden Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS) prevention information was provided to the parents of over 42,000 newborns*
- *The Child Health Program served 76,914 children between one and 21 years of age through the county health departments*

- **First Steps** is an interagency early intervention system of services for infants and toddlers with developmental disabilities. The State Department of Health serves as the lead agency for this system of coordinating services. The system is designed according to federal regulations under Part C of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA). Mississippi has fully implemented the statewide system of services as an entitlement for children with disabilities and their families.



In FY 2003, the First Steps Early Intervention Program served 5,418 children and families and approximately 3,000 children were referred to the program.

In 2004, the program plans to have results from a family satisfaction survey distributed to approximately 4,000 families.

- **The Children's Medical Program (CMP)** provides services directed towards assuring availability of comprehensive care for children and adolescents with special health care needs. Programs are rehabilitative in nature and link families and patients to related resources. CMP generally serves individuals from birth to 21 years of age.



- *Children's Medical Program operated over 650 clinic sessions at 19 sites throughout the state.*
- *In FY 2003, the program spent more than three million dollars on diagnostic and treatment services for children with special health care needs.*



- **Women's Health** provides and ensures access to comprehensive health services that affect positive outcomes for women, including early cancer detection, domestic violence prevention and intervention, family planning and maternity services.

- **The Breast and Cervical Cancer Early Detection Program** works to reduce high morbidity and mortality caused by breast and cervical cancer in Mississippi's uninsured, underinsured and minority women.

Women 50 years of age and older are the target group for mammography screening, and women 45 years and older are the target for cervical cancer screening.

From July 1998 to September 5, 2003, over 11,000 women were screened through the agency's Breast and Cervical Cancer Program.



- **The Domestic Violence/Rape Prevention and Crisis Intervention Program** provides specific resources through contracts with domestic violence shelters and rape crisis programs. The domestic violence shelters provide direct services to women and children who are victims of domestic violence.

In FY 2003, the 13 domestic violence shelters that received funding from the program:

- *answered 25,190 crisis line calls*
- *provided shelter for 2,323 women and children*

Domestic violence shelters provided:

- *educational activities to 68,406 participants through a total of 1,695 programs*

Rape Crisis Programs conducted:

- *377 community education sessions for a total of 26,111 participants*
- *youth education training was provided to 39,369 males and females*
- *law enforcement training included 87 sessions to a total of 903 participants*



- **Osteoporosis Screening and Awareness** establishes, maintains and promotes an osteoporosis prevention, treatment and education program.

In 2002, over 1,200 Mississippians were screened at 23 osteoporosis screening sites.

- **The Genetics Program** provides comprehensive genetic services statewide including newborn screening, diagnosis, counseling, and follow-up of a broad range of genetic-related disorders. The program began screening Mississippi newborns for a total of 40 genetic disorders in June 2003, making Mississippi's the most comprehensive newborn screening programs in the nation.

The Genetics Program screens an average of 3,300 newborns per month for genetic disorders.

- *Approximately 200 infants per month require follow-up for inconclusive or abnormal newborn screening results.*
- *An average of 340 children and families received genetic clinical services each month through county health departments and satellite clinics in FY 2003.*



- **Maternity Services** aim to reduce low birth weight and infant mortality and morbidity in Mississippi by providing comprehensive, risk-appropriate prenatal care through county health departments.

More than 6,500 pregnant Mississippi women – about 16 percent of the women who gave birth in CY 2002 – received their prenatal care through county health department clinics.



- **The Perinatal High Risk Management/Infant Services System (PHRM/ISS)** provides a multidisciplinary team approach to high-risk mothers and infants statewide. These enhanced services include nursing, nutrition and social work. This team of professionals provides risk screening assessments, counseling, health education, home visiting, and monthly case management.

- **Pregnancy Risk Assessment Monitoring System (PRAMS)** is part of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) initiative to reduce infant mortality and low birth weight. PRAMS is an on-going, state specific, population-based surveillance system designed to identify and monitor selected maternal behaviors and experiences before, during and after pregnancy.



● **WIC — Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children**

WIC improves the outcome of pregnancies; reduces health problems associated with poor nutrition during pregnancy, infancy and early childhood; and reduces infant mortality. WIC provides special supplemental food and nutrition education to low-income pregnant, postpartum, and breastfeeding women, infants, and preschool children who have nutrition-related risk conditions.

In FY 2003, the WIC Program:

- *Served an average of 102,566 women, infants and children*
- *Served 100 percent of eligible babies, age one year and under – which represents 74 percent of all babies in the state*
- *Had a participation rate of 95 percent of those enrolled*
- *In partnership with Mississippi Department of Agriculture operated a Farmer's Market in six counties*
- *Distributed 1,230,786 monthly food packages at an average cost of \$33.68 per package*
- *Served a monthly average of 23,802 pregnant, postpartum, and breastfeeding women and 47,998 children under the age of five years*
- *Breastfeeding Program staff provided a monthly average of more than 62,532 telephone counseling calls; 13,608 clinic visits to prenatal and postpartum breastfeeding women; 2,772 home visits; and 2,748 hospital visits to postpartum breastfeeding women.*

Changes in State Law

2003 Legislative Session affecting the Mississippi State Department of Health:

Administrative

State Board of Health

Senate Bill 2338 amends the current statute to require that three board members be appointed from each of the four congressional districts that existed as of January 1, 2003, and one member appointed at large. *Nine (9) members shall be persons engaged professionally in rendering health services, and of those nine (9) members (a) no more than four (4) may be engaged professionally in rendering the same general type of health services or possess the same type of professional license and (b) no two (2) members may be associated or affiliated with, or employed by, the same entity or employer.* New appointments shall be made such that the mandated structure is in place by July 1, 2008.

Health Planning and Resources

Certificate of Need for Critical Access Hospitals

House Bill 1429 authorizes hospitals that have been licensed as *Critical Access Hospitals* to relicense acute care beds, without obtaining a new certificate of need, if such beds were previously delicensed in order to gain the *Critical Access Hospital* designation.

Epidemiology

Vaccinations for First Responders and College Students

House Bill 1087 requires the department to *offer a vaccination program for first responders who may be exposed to infectious diseases when deployed to disaster locations . . . This section shall be effective upon receipt of federal funding and/or federal grants for administering a first responders vaccination program.*

House Bill 1087 also requires MSDH to “prepare written educational information on the risks associated with meningitis and hepatitis A and B and. . . shall provide this written educational information to the Board of Trustees of State Institutions of Higher Learning and the State Board for Community and Junior Colleges to be used to inform students about meningitis and hepatitis A and B.”



Child Health

Death Scene Investigation for Unexplained Infant Deaths

House Bill 998 requires county medical examiners to investigate the scenes of all unexplained infant (under two years of age) deaths using protocols established by the State Medical Examiner. This legislation was proposed by the Mississippi State Board of Health, the American Academy of Pediatrics and the Mississippi SIDS Coalition.

Infant Mortality Task Force

House Bill 777 extends the sunset provision for the Infant Mortality Task Force to July 1, 2005.

Health Care Facility Licensure

Accreditation of Certain Childcare Educational Programs

Senate Bill 2149 extends the sunset provision to July 1, 2004 for the statute that defines the term *accreditation* for childcare programs that are deemed licensure as childcare facilities.

Assessment of Status of Early Childhood Education Programs

Senate Bill 2636 establishes an oversight committee of state agency officials and members of the private sector to assess early childhood education programs by October 1, 2003. A representative of MSDH is authorized to serve on the Committee.

Background/Fingerprint Checks for Healthcare Workers

House Bill 1077 clarifies the statutory requirements for background checks and fingerprinting for healthcare workers that were originally passed in 2001.

Vulnerable Adults Act

Senate Bill 2427 amends the current statute to require an employee or associate of a healthcare facility to provide a written report to the facility of any gift of cash or other values in excess of twenty-five dollars from a patient or resident of such facility.

Environmental

Mississippi Individual On-site Wastewater Disposal System Law

House Bill 845 extends the sunset provision to July 1, 2005 for the Mississippi On-site Wastewater Disposal System Law. The statutes were also amended to require the On-site Wastewater Disposal System Advisory Committee to *examine all aspects of the law and health and environmental concerns, including the economic feasibility and availability of sewers as required by Section 41-67-7, and make recommendations to the Legislature on or before September 1, 2004.*

Local Governments and Rural Water Systems Improvements Revolving Loan Fund

House Bill 1592 provides for an additional \$130,000 in state bond funding to match available federal funds.
